Head Coaches



Jets Head Coach Eric Mangini *2nd year with the Jets*

Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick *8th year with the Patriots*

After he was named the 14th full-time head coach of the New York Jets on January 17, 2006, Eric Mangini led the Jets to a 10-6 record and a trip to the AFC Wild Card Game. Mangini's Jets used an innovative, multiple-formation offense that emphasized the strengths of quarterback Chad Pennington, who established career-highs while starting every game for the first time in his career. The defense morphed each week depending on the opponent. Mangini's efforts were recognized when he was named AFC Coach of the Year by the Kansas City Committee of 101.

Mangini is in his stint with the Jets, having previously served on Bill Parcells' staff from 1997-1999, where he worked primarily as the defensive assistant/quality control coach responsible for advance opponent film breakdowns and analysis. Between his stints with the Jets, Mangini spent six seasons with the New England Patriots under head coach Bill Belichick. He was the defensive backs coach for five years before he was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 2005 season.

Mangini played nose tackle and earned four letters (1989-90, '92-93) at Wesleyan University in Middletown, CT. He began his NFL career as a ball-boy with the Cleveland Browns in 1994. He then moved into an intern position in the Browns public relations department where his efforts were noticed by then-Cleveland head coach Belichick, who offered Mangini a position on his Browns coaching staff in 1995. When the Browns relocated to Baltimore in 1996, Mangini moved with the franchise and joined Ted Marchibroda's staff.

Mangini was born on January 19, 1971, in Hartford, CT. He hosts a one-day Football Fundamentals mini-camp in Hartford each year giving athletes in grades 8-12 a chance to be taught by some of the NFL's top players and coaches. Proceeds from the camp benefit The Carmine and Frank Mangini (CFM) Foundation.

Bill Belichick is in his 33rd season as an NFL coach. He is the only head coach in league history to win three Super Bowl championships in a four-year span and is now the most experienced head coach in the NFL. Hired by Chair man and CEO Robert Kraft on January 27, 2000, Belichick is in his eighth season as New England's head coach. In 2001, just his second season at the helm, Belichick guided the Patriots to their first league title with a dramatic victory in Super Bowl XXXVI.

Belichick directed the Patriots to victories in Super Bowls XXXVI (2001), XXXVIII (2003) and XXXIX (2004). The Patriots four straight years of playoff advancement mark the longest current streak in the NFL, while their string of four consecutive division crowns is a team record and is tied for the longest current streak in the league.

Only one coach (Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll, 4) has won more Super Bowls than Belichick, and his three Super Bowl titles tie Washington's Joe Gibbs and San Francisco's Bill Walsh for second on the NFL's all-time list. Belichick's 13 career playoff victories rank fifth all-time among NFL head coaches.

Belichick began as an assistant coach with the Baltimore Colts (1975), Detroit (1976-77), Denver (1978), and the New York Giants (1979-90) where he contributed to two Super Bowls under Bill Parcells as defensive coordinator. Belichick was named head coach of the Cleveland Browns in 1991, where he was 36-44 as a head coach in five years, leading the Browns to one playoff appearance. After a year as an assistant at the Patriots in 1996, Belichick joined the Jets with Parcells for three seasons (1997-99) before heading back to the Patriots.

Belichick played center and tight end at Wesleyan from 1971-74, the same alma mater as Eric Mangini. He was born in Nashville.

QUOTING COACH MANGINI ON EXPECTATIONS FOR 2007

"As you go into a season, you look at it as its own entity, and things that happen in the past aren't necessarily going to affect the future. You control the future by the way that you work, the way that you study, the way that you prepare, the way that you execute. Regardless of how the team is viewed or what the perception is, that's really not the significant thing. The significant thing is what you do day in and day out to become a better team."

FOR OPENERS

The Jets open the season at home for only the 13th time in their 48-year history and for only the sixth time since 1990 and seventh time since moving to the Meadowlands.

The franchise is 5-7 in season openers at home:

- 2-4 at the Meadowlands
- 2-3 at Shea Stadium
- 1-0 at the Polo Grounds

The Jets have faced the Patriots twice in home openers and have lost both games (0-2):

- On Sept. 12, 1999, after losing **Vinny Testaverde** to a season-ending injury, the Jets rallied behind punter and No. 2 QB **Tom Tupa** to lead 28-27 before **Adam Vinatieri**'s FG with :03 remaining.

- On Sept. 10, 1989, the Jets overcame a 21-0 halftime deficit to lead, 24-21 in the fourth quarter before a late touchdown gave the Pats a 27-24 victory.

MR. JOHNSON'S MILLENIUM

The current decade has already equaled the most successful in Jets franchise history. The Jets have qualified for the playoffs four times in the seven seasons of the 2000s, equaling the high of four playoff appearances in the 1980s. The millennium kicked off on a high note as Chairman and CEO, **Woody Johnson**, officially acquired the Jets on January 18, 2000.

MR. T'S TEN YEARS

The followers of the franchise were once called long-suffering Jets fans for good reason. Seven playoff appearances in 37 years and one golden memory of Super Bowl III.

But things changed for the better when **Bill Parcells** was handed the keys by **Leon Hess** in 1997. The last decade has included two AFC East titles (1998, 2002), five playoff appearances and seven winning seasons. **Mike Tannenbaum**, one of Parcells' first front office hires, has been a part of it all working his way to the General Manager role as the Jets have won 54 percent of their regular-season games.

PENNINGTON WRITES AN IMPRESSIVE TALE

Chad Pennington, now in his eighth year out of Marshall University, was the feel-good story of the league in 2006. The Knoxville native rebounded from two separate shoulder surgeries to start every game for the first time in his career. He led the Jets to the postseason (313 completions – 485 attempts, 3,352 yards, 16 INT, 17 TD, 82.6 rating) while earning The Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year. The Jets have qualified for the playoffs in each year he has started a minimum of 12 games (2002, 2004, 2006).

RUN, LEON, RUN

THE VERSATILE MR. SMITH

The first of the Jets' two fourth-round selections in 2006, QB **Brad Smith** started two games as a RB and one game at WR in his rookie season.

At Missouri, Smith became the first player in NCAA history to run for 4,000 yards and pass for 8,000 yards.

For the Jets, Smith lined up at RB, WR and QB, rushing 18 times for 103 yards, and catching nine passes for 61 yards in 2006 while also logging 10 special teams tackles.

BAKER'S ONE

TE **Chris Baker's** first full season as a starter for the Jets culminated in career highs in receptions (31) and receiving yards (300). The sixth-year Michigan State product also scored four touchdowns, three from one yard out, giving him six one-yard touchdown catches in his career. He is tied with former Jets TE **Anthony Becht** for the most one-yard touchdown catches in franchise history.

NICK AND D'BRICK

LT **D'Brickshaw Ferguson**, the Jets fourth overall pick in 2006 and C **Nick Mangold**, the Jets 29th overall pick in 2006, each started all 16 games of

the regular season, as well as the team's postseason contest, and were each named to two NFL All-Rookie teams (*Pro Football Weekly* and *Pro Football Writers' Association*).

The Jets selection of two offensive linemen in the first round marked the first time a team drafted two OL in the first round since the Los Angeles Rams in 1975 (Dennis Harrah and Doug France).

Ferguson was the first left tackle to start every game of his rookie season for the Jets since **Chris Ward**, also a Jets' first-round draft pick, in 1978.

Mangold was the first center in the Jets 47-year history to start every game in his rookie season.

NUGENT ON TARGET

Mike Nugent, the Jets third-year placekicker from Ohio State, converted 18 consecutive field goals to end the regular season, including 23-of-his-last-24. He then hit all three of his field goal attempts at New England in the AFC Wild Card Game. He finished the regular season 24-of-27 (88.5 percent, the best in franchise history) with 106 points. ELLIS AT END

Defensive end **Shaun Ellis**, in his eighth year with the Jets, has 48.5 career sacks, seventh all-time in Jets history. Ellis has played in 108 of a possible 112 regular season games for New York, which places him sixth all-time among Jets defensive linemen. His seven years with the Jets ties him with **Chad Pennington** as the two longest-tenured current Jets.

D-ROB IN THE MIDDLE

Fifth-year nose tackle **Dewayne Robertson** is a rare combination of speed and stoutness not often seen for a nose tackle. He was fifth in tackles last season among all defensive tackles with 62, while registering 2.5 sacks.

In the second half of last season, Robertson played a central role as the Jets toughened up the run defense, averaging 117.5 yards allowed after allowing 143 yards per game over the first eight games.

VILMA HAT TRICK

In three seasons with the Jets, **Jonathan Vilma** has established himself as one of the better inside linebackers in the NFL.

2006: The fourth-year man out of Miami recorded a team-high 116 tackles, his third consecutive season with more than 100 tackles. Vilma was the first Jets linebacker since **Kyle Clifton** (1984-86) to record more than 100 tackles in each of his first three NFL seasons.

2005: Vilma led the NFL in tackles with 187 in 2005, earning a berth in the Pro Bowl while being named Team MVP.

2004: Earned AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors in 2004 while totaling 118 tackles and three interceptions.

BT FINDS HIS NICHE

Bryan Thomas made the switch last season from defensive end to linebacker and the move immediately paid dividends for the Jets defense. The sixth-year man from Alabama-Birmingham had a career-high 77 tackles and 8.5 sacks, including a stretch of six games late in the season where he had 6.5 sacks.

RHODES TO HOLLYWOOD

Safety **Kerry Rhodes**, who appeared on the cover of Essence Magazine cover and in minor movie roles, has compiled an impressive list of on-field credits in his first two seasons. After playing at Louisville, Rhodes has started all 32 games, and put up five sacks last season, the most ever by a Jets defensive back in franchise history, to go with four interceptions. Rhodes' first three sacks in 2006 resulted in forced fumbles that were recovered by the Jets.

2007 DRAFT CLASS

All four of the Jets 2007 NFL Draft picks made contributions during the preseason.

CB Darrelle Revis started in his first preseason action vs. the Giants (8/25), posting five solo tackles and a pass defended. Revis finished the preseason with eight solo stops and one pass defended in two starts.

LB David Harris, the second-round choice from Michigan, topped out the preseason tied for the Jets lead with 14 tackles (12 solo) while logging playing time inside and on special teams.

OL Jacob Bender, the sixth-round pick out of Division I-AA Nicholls State in Thibodaux, LA, has shown flexibility working at both guard and tackle during the preseason, starting the final two games at left guard.

WR Chansi Stuckey, the Jets seventh-round selection from Clemson, has added depth to the receiving unit and led the team in receptions in the preseason with 11 for 76 yards and one touchdown and also recorded five punt returns for 76 yards.

PRACTICE SQUAD NAMED

On Sept. 3, the Jets announced the signing of the following players to the practice squad: **DB Manny Collins**, **WR Chris Davis**, **QB Brett Ratliff**, **LB Jason Trusnik**, **OL Robert Turner**, **DB Raymond Ventrone** and **RB Danny Ware**. **TE Iiro Luoto** has been designated to the International Practice Squad.

JETS FINISH PRESEASON 3-1

GAME #1 8/10/07 Atlanta W, 31-16

Jets quarterback Kellen Clemens was impressive, completing 16-of-22 — including nine straight completions during one stretch — for 174 yards and three touchdowns, including two to Sean Ryan. Quarterback-wide receiver Brad Smith was incomplete on the Jets only other pass attempt on a surprisingly chilly summer night at the Meadowlands.

GAME #2 8/17/07 Minnesota L, 20-37

The Jets were victimized by two interceptions and a fumble recovery that were returned for touchdowns. Darren Sharper returned an interception 40 yards on New York's first series, Chad Greenway later brought one back 16 yards and rookie Brian Robison scored on a fumble recovery as the Vikings took advantage of turnovers in a 37-20 victory.

GAME #3 8/25/07 at NY Giants W, 20-12

Kellen Clemens came off the bench in the second half and engineered two third-quarter touchdown drives against the Giants' to lead the Jets to a 20-12 victory in the annual preseason game between the New York rivals. Clemens completed six-of-eight passes for 122 yards and an interception.

GAME #4 8/30/07 at Philadelphia W, 13-11

Marques Tuiasosopo rallied the Jets, and Mike Nugent kicked a 35-yard field goal as time expired, lifting the Jets over the Philadelphia Eagles, 13-11. Donovan McNabb and Chad Pennington didn't play and most starters for both teams sat out. Tuiasosopo drove the Jets 65 yards for the winning kick. He completed nine-of-16 passes for 78 yards.

PRESEASON NOTABLES

CLEMENS STATUS ROCKETS: Kellen Clemens completed 30-of-41 passes for 364 yards, two interceptions and four touchdowns in the preseason. His three touchdown passes in the preseason opener vs. Atlanta (8/10) marked a preseason single-game high and he became the first Jets quarterback to throw three touchdown passes in the preseason since **Ray Lucas** threw three against the Giants on August 18, 2000. Clemens passer rating of 112.2 ranked sixth in the NFL during the preseason.

WASHINGTON'S EARLY RETURNS: Leon Washington three preseason kickoff returns for 129 yards led the NFL. His lone touchdown came on an impressive 79-yard pass from QB **Chad Pennington** in the Jets first offensive play in the first quarter against the New York Giants.

C.J. GROUNDS THE EAGLES: C.J. Mosely said after the game he had never had a stretch like that in his football life. In the first quarter vs. the Eagles in the final preseason game, Mosely recorded three sacks and two forced fumbles, one leading to a turnover. Mosley finished out the preseason tied with rookie **David Harris** for the team-lead in tackles, posting 14 stops (11 solo), two quarterback hurries, two forced fumbles and four sacks for losses of 41 yards.

RYAN'S HOPE: Sean Ryan, the Jets reserve tight end who had six catches in 2006, had eight catches for 63 yards and two touchdowns in the preseason. Both his scores came vs. Atlanta, becoming the first Jet to score multiple times in a preseason game since **LaMont Jordan** scored twice vs. the Ravens on August 15, 2002.

JUSTIN GOES LONG: Justin McCareins, the Jets seventh-year receiver from Northern Illinois, had six catches for 146 yards and a touchdown in the preseason, averaging 24.3 yards per reception. He had a preseason-long 45 yard reception vs. the Giants, a 35-yard touchdown catch vs. Minnesota and caught a 42-yarder vs. Atlanta.

QUARTERBACKS (4), RETURNING STARTERS (1)

Chad Pennington (313 completions - 485 attempts, 3,352 yards, 16 INT, 17 TD, 82.6 rtg) set career highs for completions, pass attempts and passing yards and earned recognition as The Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year after starting all 16 regular season games for the first time of his career. Pennington has led the Jets to the playoffs in all three seasons (2002, 2004, 2006) in which he has started a minimum of 12 games. **Kellen Clemens**, the team's 2006 second-round pick from Oregon, appeared in two games his rookie season, attempting one pass. In the preseason, he completed 30-of-41 passes for 364 yards and four touchdowns, while running for another score. **Brad Smith**, a 2006 fourth-round pick, has practiced at both quarterback and receiver. He finished six-of-15 passing for 50 yards in four preseason games. **Marques Tuiasosopo**, a free agent pickup after six seasons in Oakland where he started two games. In the preseason, he completed 16-of-29 passes for 146 yards and a touchdown, while running for one more score.

RUNNING BACKS (4), RETURNING STARTERS (1)

Thomas Jones, acquired in March from the Bears in a swap of second-round picks, rushed for more than 1,200 yards in each of the past two seasons, ranking seventh in the NFL in rushing attempts and 10th in rushing yards during that period. Jones totalled 1,210 yards rushing and six touchdowns in 2006 as he helped lead the Bears to the Super Bowl, where he accumulated 112 yards on 15 carries. **Leon Washington**, a 2006 fourth-round choice who started eight games last season as a rookie, led the Jets in rushing with 650 yards as a rookie and contributed 25 catches for 270 yards. At fullback, the Jets signed five-year veteran **Darian Barnes** as an unrestricted free agent. Barnes is reunited with Jones, whom he blocked for at Tampa Bay in 2003. **Stacy Tutt** played in two games in 2006 after being elevated from the practice squad.

WIDE RECEIVERS (6), RETURNING STARTERS (2)

Laveranues Coles (91-1,098-6) and **Jerricho Cotchery** (82-961-6) set a Jets record with 173 combined receptions. Coles' 91 receptions marked the second-highest single-season total in team history. Cotchery emerged with 82 catches and six touchdowns in 2006 after producing a combined total of 25 catches in his first two seasons. Seven-year veteran **Justin McCareins** is entering his fourth season with the Jets and contributed 23 receptions last season as the team's third receiver. **Brad Smith** started three games as a rookie and contributed as a rusher (9-61) and receiver (18-103). Smith caught a 34-yard pass vs. the Giants in preseason action. **Wallace Wright** played in five games as a rookie last season. Seventh-round selection **Chansi Stuckey** amassed 141 receptions and seven touchdowns at Clemson.

TIGHT ENDS (5), RETURNING STARTERS (1)

Chris Baker, in his sixth season, achieved personal bests for receptions (31), receiving yards (300) and touchdowns (four). Providing depth is **Sean Ryan**, who was acquired prior to the 2006 season from Dallas. Veteran **James Dearth** also handles the long-snapping duties. **Joe Kowalewski**, who spent 2006 on the practice squad as a free agent out of Syracuse, and **Jason Pociask**, the Jets 2006 fifth-round pick (150th).

OFFENSIVE LINE (8), RETURNING STARTERS (4)

Four-of-the-five Jets offensive linemen started all 16 games plus the playoff game in 2006. On the right side, tackle **Anthony Clement** enters his 10th season in the NFL and second season with the Jets. Clement has started 92 NFL games since being drafted in the second round by Arizona in 1998. At right guard is **Brandon Moore**, who worked his way from undrafted free agent in 2002 to starter by the end of 2003. He has started 41 consecutive games since 2004. The Jets 2006 first-round selections, center **Nick Mangold** and left tackle **D'Brickashaw Ferguson**, both enjoyed solid rookie campaigns. They were the first pair of offensive linemen to be selected in the first round by one team since the Los Angeles Rams selected Dennis Harrah and Doug France in 1975. **Adrien Clarke**, who started four games for Philadelphia in 2005 and 2007 sixth-round draft pick **Jacob Bender** are in contention at left guard. Versatile **Wade Smith** provides depth at more than one position and veteran tackle **Adrian Jones** provides experience on the outside.



Overview



DEFENSIVE LINE (7), RETURNING STARTERS (2)

The defensive front anchored a defensive unit that allowed 117.5 rushing yards per game during the second half of the season, improving from 143 rushing yards per game allowed in the first eight contests. **Shaun Ellis**, the longest-tenured Jets player along with Chad Pennington, returns for his eighth year at defensive end. In the middle, **Dewayne Robertson** enters his fifth year. At end, **Kenyon Coleman**, who joined the team as an unrestricted free agent from Dallas, is vying for time along with **Eric Hicks**, acquired as an unrestricted free agent from Kansas City, starting his 10th year in the NFL. Providing depth is **C.J. Mosley**, who had four sacks in the preseason, third-year tackle **Sione Pouha** and undrafted rookie free agent **Mike DeVito** from Maine.

LINEBACKERS (8), RETURNING STARTERS (4)

The Jets return all four starters from 2006: outside linebackers **Bryan Thomas** and **Victor Hobson** and inside linebackers **Eric Barton** and **Jonathan Vilma**. Thomas, in his sixth-year enjoyed a break-out campaign, leading the team with 8.5 sacks. Hobson, now in his fifth year with the Jets, set a career-high with six sacks and returned a fumble 32 yards for a touchdown at Buffalo. Nine-year veteran Barton recorded exactly 100 tackles in 2006, the fourth time he reached that mark in his career, while Vilma led the team with 116 stops. Veterans **Brad Kassell**, who started one game last year during his first season with the Jets, and **David Bowens**, an eight-year veteran who had five sacks for Miami last season, are expected to compete. Second-round pick **David Harris** is working to get playing time on the inside along with **Cody Spencer** (third year).

DEFENSIVE BACKS (10), RETURNING STARTERS (4)

At cornerback, **Andre Dyson** tallied four interceptions in his first year with the Jets in 2006 and has picked off 21 passes in his career, returning four for touchdowns. Eight-year veteran **David Barrett** was responsible for three interceptions last season, and has recorded a total of 10 in his three seasons for New York. **Hank Poteat** notched a career-high 34 tackles in 13 games for New England and the Jets last year, while **Justin Miller**, who was elected to the Pro Bowl as a kick returner, started four games at corner in 2006. **Drew Coleman** earned four starts at corner as a rookie last season and 2007 first-round pick **Darrelle Revis** have also been battling for playing time. **Kerry Rhodes**, in his third year, and **Erik Coleman**, in his fourth year, patrol the defensive backfield at safety. Second-year safety **Eric Smith** corralled two interceptions in his rookie season. Special teams' ace **Rashad Washington** will also compete at safety.

SPECIALISTS (2), RETURNING STARTERS (2)

Mike Nugent returns for his third season after he converted 24-of-27 field goals (88.9 percent) in 2006, the most accurate season in Jets history. He has connected on his last 18 regular-season attempts, as well as all three of his field goals in the Wild Card contest. Australian **Ben Graham** returns for his third season as the Jets punter. In 2006, he improved his gross punting average to 44.2 yards (37.8 net), placing 26 punts inside the 20-yard line.



The New Coaches



Head Strength & Conditioning Sal Alosi – Alosi returns to the Jets after serving as the Head Strength & Conditioning coach for the Atlanta Falcons in 2006. Initially an intern with the Jets, Alosi was elevated to an assistant strength and conditioning coach where he served the team in that capacity from 2002-05 under former strength coach John Lott. Before entering the NFL, he served as the assistant strength & conditioning coach for Hofstra University, where he played linebacker from 1996-2000.

Quality Control - Offense Mike Bloomgren – Bloomgren joins the Jets after spending the last two seasons as the offensive coordinator for Delta State University. In his two seasons with the Statesmen, his offense passed for more than 7,500 yards. Prior to his duties at Delta State University, Bloomgren enjoyed stints with Catawba College (2002-2004) as the co-offensive coordinator, University of Alabama (1999-2001) as an offensive line graduate assistant & defensive graduate assistant and Florida State University (1997-98) as an undergraduate coach. The 2007 season is his first in the NFL.

Quarterbacks Coach Brian Daboll – Daboll accepted the opportunity to tutor Jets quarterbacks after spending the previous five seasons with division-rival New England. While with the Patriots, Daboll coached the wide receivers and worked as a defensive assistant. Before joining the NFL, Daboll served as an administrative assistant and graduate assistant/defense at Michigan State and a restricted volunteer earnings coach/defense at the College of William & Mary. He roamed the secondary for Rochester from 1994-1997.

Assistant Strength & Conditioning Mike Jones – Another first-time NFL coach, Jones joined the Jets after working with Arizona State University as the sports performance assistant. Jones enjoyed a productive career with the Georgia Bulldogs as a safety from 1989-1992.

Quality Control - Defense/Special Teams Ben Kotwica -- Kotwica joined the Jets after coordinating the defensive efforts of the U.S. Military Academy Preparatory School for two seasons. Prior to coaching, Kotwica flew an AH-64 Apache Longbow for the United States Army. During his time in the Army, he flew more than 1,000 combat hours in addition to providing VIP escorts for President Bush, Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld and Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. Kotwica was a three-year starter at linebacker for current Jets defensive coordinator Bob Sutton.

Defensive Backs Coach Mike MacIntyre – A 16-year coaching veteran, MacIntyre comes to the Jets after tutoring the safeties for the Dallas Cowboys. He entered the NFL as the secondary assistant for the Cowboys in 2003. Prior to his time in Dallas, MacIntyre spent four seasons (1999-2002) coaching the wide receivers and secondary for the University of Mississippi. He also served as defensive backs coach for Temple University (1997-98) and as defensive coordinator for both the University of Tennessee-Martin (1993-1996) and Davidson College (1992). His coaching career began with the University of Georgia as a graduate assistant in 1991. MacIntyre was a defensive back for both Georgia Tech and Vanderbilt.

Defensive Line Coach Dan Quinn – Entering his seventh season in the NFL, Quinn will oversee the defensive line for his third NFL team. Prior to coming to the Jets, he enjoyed stints with the Miami Dolphins (2005-2006) and the San Francisco 49ers (2003-2004). Quinn entered the NFL as a defensive quality control coach for the 49ers (2001-2002). He returns to Hempstead, NY, where he served as the defensive coordinator (2000) and defensive line coach (1996-1999) for Hofstra. He also enjoyed one-year stints at Virginia Military Institute (defensive tackles/recruiting coordinator) and William & Mary (assistant defensive line) after contributing as a defensive lineman at Salisbury State (MD) from 1989-1993.

Quality Control - Offense Brian Smith – Smith joins the NFL for the first time after spending seven seasons at the University of Massachusetts where he coached the wide receivers from 2005-2006 and their linebackers in 2004. He performed as a defensive back for the Minutemen from 1997-2000.

The New Veterans



OFFENSE

Fullback Darian Barnes -- A veteran of 60 NFL games, Barnes traveled north in the off-season from Miami, FL to familiar surroundings (Tri-State area). He also reunited with a former backfield mate in Thomas Jones - the two spent the 2002 campaign together as members of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. "Barnes is a big stick," said Jets head coach Eric Mangini. "He will thump you." For his career, Barnes has carried the ball five times for 10 yards, all in 2004, and caught 14 passes for 87 yards and a TD.

Guard Adrien Clarke -- Clarke looks to begin anew in the Green & White after spending his first two NFL seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles. In his second NFL season, Clarke started four games and played in a total of 13 contests. After being waived by the Eagles at the end of training camp in 2006, Clarke was signed by the Jets as a free agent. Clarke started next to Jets center Nick Mangold at Ohio State in 2003.

Running Back Thomas Jones -- After rushing for more than 1,200 yards in each of the last two seasons, Jones was acquired by the Jets in a trade with Chicago that also saw the teams swap 2007 second-round selections. Over the last two seasons, his totals rank seventh in the NFL for rushing attempts and 10th for rushing yards. In seven NFL seasons, he has played in 100 games, posting 63 starts and recording 1,349 carries for 5,384 yards and 34 TD. He has also caught 215 passes for 1,376 yards. During the last three seasons, Jones has generated an average of 1,406 yards from scrimmage.

Quarterback Marques Tuiasosopo -- Selected in the second round of the 2001 draft by Oakland, Tuiasosopo has played in 11 NFL games, including two starts. He threw his first NFL touchdown pass at the Meadowlands versus the Jets in 2005. Prior to being selected by Oakland, Tuiasosopo threw for 5,501 yards, the third-highest total in school history at the University of Washington, and earned recognition as the Pac-10 Player of the Year as a senior in 2000.

DEFENSE

Linebacker David Bowens -- Another former Miami performer that has traveled north on Interstate 95 to join the Jets, Bowens brings eight years of NFL experience and 26 career sacks. He has played in all 48 games for the Dolphins during the last three seasons, registering 85 tackles, 11 PD and 18 sacks.

Defensive End Kenyon Coleman -- Coleman signed as an unrestricted free agent with the New York Jets after spending four seasons with Dallas where he played for former Jets Head Coach Bill Parcells. Initially a fifth-round draft choice by Oakland in 2002, Coleman played in one game for a Raiders team that earned the AFC Championship. For his career, he has played in 57 games and recorded 74 tackles, 6.5 sacks, three PD, one FF and one FR.

Defensive End Eric Hicks -- After nine seasons, 128 games and 104 starts for the Kansas City Chiefs, Hicks joins the Jets as an unrestricted free agent. During his stretch with the Chiefs, Hicks recorded 572 tackles, 44.5 sacks, 15 PD, nine FF and five FR. He enjoyed his most productive season in 2000 when he recorded a career-high 14 sacks, 61 tackles, two PD and one FR in 13 games. Dating back to the 2000 season, Hicks has played in 102 consecutive football games.

GAME NOTES

- ▶ Chad Pennington started his fifth playoff game for the Jets, the most by a Jets quarterback. Starts by Jets quarterbacks in the postseason: Chad Pennington – 5; Richard Todd – 4; Joe Namath – 3; Pat Ryan – 3; Vinny Testaverde – 3; Ken O'Brien – 1.
- ▶ Chad Pennington's 77-yard touchdown strike to Jerricho Cotchery was the longest offensive play in Jets postseason history, surpassing the 56-yard score from Pennington to Richie Anderson in the 2002 Wild Card Playoff Game against Indianapolis. Pennington and Cotchery also connected for the longest offensive play of the 2006 Jets season, a 71-yard touchdown pass in Week Two against the Patriots. The touchdown pass was Pennington's seventh in the postseason, the most by a Jets quarterback.
- ▶ Pennington completed 23-of-40 passes for 300 yards, 1 TD and 1 INT. Pennington's career postseason totals: 107 completions (1st all-time Jets history), 178 attempts (1st), 1,166 yards (1st) and seven touchdowns (1st). The 300 yards passing for Pennington is a single-game playoff high.
- ▶ Chris Baker's five receptions for 68 yards set playoff single-game highs for the tight end in his fifth playoff game. It's also the second-most yards by a

- Jets tight end in a postseason game, trailing only Mickey Shuler (6-116-1) in the 1981 Wild Card game vs. Buffalo.
- ▶ Jerricho Cotchery became the 10th Jets player to record a 100-yard receiving game in the postseason, with his four receptions for 100 yards and a touchdown. Cotchery's 100 yards receiving tie him with Santana Moss for the ninth in Jets postseason history. Moss had four receptions for 100 yards in the 2004 Wild Card playoff game at San Diego.
- ▶ Mike Nugent kicked three field goals in three attempts, 28, 21, and 37 yards. He finished the game with 10 points. His three field goals tied a Jets postseason record held by Jim Turner in Super Bowl III and Pat Leahy in the 1982 playoffs vs. the Bengals.
- ▶ Dewayne Robertson forced his first career postseason fumble, when he stripped running back Corey Dillon of the ball in the first quarter. The fumble was the first of Dillon's career in 110 postseason carries. The fumble was recovered by Hank Poteat, the first postseason fumble recovery of his career.

Head coach Eric Mangini

Opening statement...

"I talked to the team. An extremely tough loss—I thought that we made some good plays throughout the course of the game and they made some good plays as well, but in the end, they were able to execute more effectively than we were. They do a better job on third down, on both sides of the ball. Stopping the run defensively was going to be extremely important. Not turning the ball over—they got some points late off of turnovers that put us in a little bit tougher spot than it had been. They're a good football team and I give them a lot of credit. They've won a lot of games here in the playoffs and they out-executed us. That's what it was, that's what it came down to. I told the team that I was proud of the way that they fought, proud of the way that they approached the preparation, their effort throughout

the course of the week and in the game, but in the end it still just came down to execution. Really, I told them I was most proud in terms of the season, not at the 10-6 record, not at getting to the playoffs. I was most proud of the effort that they put in, the way that they worked, the way that they came together as a team, and the progress that we made collectively. That's something that we need to continue to do as a team is to make progress and be able to move forward. That's what we're looking forward to doing in the seasons to come."

On New England's adjustments to the blitz packages from last game...

"They started out in the no-huddle—it was something that we'd worked on—but that initial drive. I think that was one answer. They did a little bit better job where they incorporated more quick outs to try to

prevent the disguise, that type of thing. Then, [they] mixed in the screens, some wide receiver screens and things like that as well.”

On Chad Pennington’s backward pass/fumble...

“It was really an extended handoff. I thought the angle that Chad released it wasn’t behind the line of scrimmage and it had been tipped there. It was such a big field position changing play, I thought that we should challenge it.”

On the Patriots’ “Red Zone” defense...

“They’re pretty good in the red zone and they’ve been good all year. We knew that it would be tough—it would be tough to score there. The way the game was going, points were at a premium so I thought it was best to get the field goal. They’ve been very effective all year; you saw that, we anticipated that coming in and I thought they played well in the red zone again today.”

On the Jets’ “Red Zone” offense...

“I felt very good about the red zone package coming into the game and looking at it and understanding the things that we were going to get. We were close on some of those throws—a couple feet here or there and it would have been a different story. I liked the approach that we had going in, it just didn’t work out as well as we expected.”

On Chad Pennington’s performance...

“Yeah, there are a few throws that I think Chad would like to have back, but you saw, again, Chad’s toughness. He got hit a couple times there—maybe more than a couple times—pretty hard and he just bounced back up. He’s tough and he’s got great leadership and I thought that his approach and his leadership throughout the week was outstanding.”

On the coaching approach of Patriots...

“I think that Bill [Belichick] and the staff do a great job every single week and you see it throughout the course of the season, where their approach when playing Minnesota is extremely different than Miami, than Buffalo, than you, and their approach in game one, to game two, to game three is going to be different. There are problems and you’re going to work on fixing them. You’re constantly trying to jump back and forth and they’ve done an excellent job week-in and week-out.”

QB Chad Pennington

On his feelings after the game...

“(I’m feeling) numb. I think after a loss like this and when you’ve accomplished a lot of things as a team, when you have overcome a lot of adversity and have done some things that people didn’t expect you to do, and then it all comes crashing down in 60 minutes worth of football, you are numb because you don’t expect it to end this way. There’s not one teammate of mine in that locker room who didn’t expect to win. We didn’t come here just to get a ‘congratulations’ or a pat on the back and say ‘good job Jets, we’ll see you next season.’ We came here to win, we came here to advance. I don’t think we have anything to hang our heads about, but it’s definitely tough when you lose and when your season ends.”

On taking a moral victory...

“As an athlete and as a competitor it’s hard to take moral victories because a moral victory is a loss. I know I’m in this to win and that’s the only thing that’s gratifying. Never one time this year was the effort not there from us. Never one time this year did we not prepare hard or work hard in practice and do those things. Just like every NFL team does, and especially in the playoffs, it normally comes down to probably a handful of the plays and that’s what happened. They made a couple more plays than we did and they gained the edge.”

On what play was the turning point of the game...

“I’m sure you want me to say the fumble, but our defense did a good job of holding them to a field goal. There’s not one [play]. I don’t think there’s ever one, not unless it comes down to the last series of the last drive and you’re tied. In this game, there’s probably four or five. If you look at the stats, the three things that stick out to me most, first of all is third down efficiency, they were better than us in that area. Secondly, is the red zone efficiency, they were better than us in that area. And then time of possession, they had seven more minutes of possession than we did. So those three things, you win those three categories, normally you win the game.”

On scoring field goals instead of touchdowns...

“There’s a reason why the Patriots set a franchise record for scoring in a season – they’ve given up maybe 15 points a game, I believe. There’s a reason for that. The reason is they have the ability to play defense in the red zone and still stop the run with

their front seven. That's why they're so good. They don't have to blitz. They don't have to leave receivers one-on-one to get an extra rusher against the passer. They can take their front seven, stop the run and then play all their combo coverages and defend down there. It's very hard to get it in there. Looking at it, it's always hindsight, you may want to do a couple of different things, but I knew every time that we got down there that we had to come away with something. We couldn't give an opportunity for a turnover or something like that."

On rhythm of offense today...

"The first half was a little bit spurdy and we would've liked to be more consistent in the first half. The second half, up until the fumble play and then even past that, we moved the ball effectively and efficiently and moved the ball down the field. So it was kind of the tale of two halves and then that one play gave them a two-score lead and made it tougher."

On the Patriots defense...

"They respected us. They respected our passing game and they played a lot of zones, they didn't pressure us a lot – the first two plays of the game and then maybe once in the second half is about all they pressured us. They really respected our passing game and our receivers. I think their mentality was to win time of possession and put points on the board and defensively bend but don't break. They did a really good job of it."

On getting closer to the Patriots level...

"Every year, every team is going to look to get better -- look to improve, look to make adjustments -- to make the organization and the team better. As far as getting to the Patriots level, we feel like we had the team to compete with them and beat them. It always comes down to a couple plays here and there. That's the difference in this league, it's not like college, where you just put the ball down and can automatically tell one team is better than the other. That's why fans love our game. On opening day, there are 32 teams and fans of 32 teams that think their team has a chance. You look at all the great stories that happen every year in the NFL, it's because of the parity and because of the great job that the NFL does with the teams to create this excitement."

LB Jonathan Vilma

On defensive performance by Jets...

"It came down to execution again. There were times when we could've made the play or should've made

the play but we didn't make the play. We had a breakdown here or a breakdown there and on top of that with Tom Brady you can't have breakdowns technically, mentally, physically or he's going to capitalize. He's going to excel on plays like that and capitalize on your mistakes. But defensively there were times we played well and times we didn't play well."

DE Bryan Thomas

On the game...

"It was tough and they are a great football team. We just have to come in the off-season and fix the mistakes. Work harder in the off-season and come back stronger. They did a lot of things against us today. They spread us out, they quick counted us, they hard counted us, and they did everything. They brought the whole house against us today. They are a good football team, that's all I can say. We just have to work better in the off-season and get it right."

On Tom Brady...

"He is great. He held the ball and watched the play clock. He did all of his checks and everything. Hats off to him and I wish him the best."

S Kerry Rhodes

On what the Patriots did differently this game...

"They sped us up. They ran the no huddle so it was tough for us to move around because we had to get situated ourselves. They changed the count up on us a lot so it was tough for us to disguise."

On fourth quarter...

"They converted on third down. They did a good job down the stretch on third down, keeping us on the field. It just came down to them making more plays than we did. We thought we were still in the game. A couple of things here and there and it could have been different, but, like I said, they made more plays than we did."

WR Laveranues Coles

On if there was anything they could take away from the game...

"No. The fact that we lost. That's the only thing we can take away from it. I'm disappointed it came to an end this way, but I want to thank the guys. We showed a lot of resilience and played well, but it's disappointing right now. It hurts right now."

GAME NOTES

► The Jets scored the first touchdown of the game on a 16-play, 81-yard touchdown drive that consumed 9:12 off the clock. On the drive, the Jets converted a fourth-and-one when quarterback Chad Pennington rushed for three yards. The conversion was the first the Patriots have given up on fourth down this season. Pennington added punting to his repertoire when he booted a 29-yard punt in the third quarter that was downed at the Patriots four-yard line.

► The win, marked Pennington's second in three games at Gillette Stadium. In three career-regular season games at "The Razor," Pennington has completed 64-of-96 passes for 615 yards, four TD and one INT. His lone defeat came in 2004, when both teams met with a 5-0 record.

► Safety Kerry Rhodes recorded the first fumble recovery of his career when he picked up Doug Gabriel's fumble in the second quarter which set up the Jets first touchdown drive.

► Safety Erik Coleman intercepted his first pass of the season when he stepped in front of a Tom Brady pass with 6:54 left in the game. The turnover led to the Jets final points of the game, a 22-yard touchdown pass from Pennington to Jerricho Cotchery. It

was the pair's fourth touchdown connection of the season.

► Wide receiver Jerricho Cotchery, finished the game with six receptions for 70 yards and one TD. For the season versus the Patriots, Cotchery totaled 12 receptions for 191 yards and two TD. Of his 12 receptions, 10 went for first downs.

► The Jets set a season-high in sacks with four. All four sacks were recorded by different players as defensive linemen Dewayne Robertson, Kimo von Oelhoffen, Shaun Ellis, and defensive lineman/linebacker Bryan Thomas each had a sack. Ellis' sack and forced fumble ended the game.

► The Jets defense held the Patriots' offense to 3-of-12 on third down attempts. The 25% conversion rate was tied for the lowest (Denver 9/24) by the Patriots' offense for the season.

Head coach Eric Mangini

Opening Statement...

"I was just so proud of the way that our guys fought. I've talked a lot about this, about the hard work that this team has put in and I've been proud of the effort throughout. There were a lot of things that we worked on; things we worked on throughout the bye and I was really pleased with the complete team effort. It was going to take a good performance on offense, on defense, on special teams collectively, together to beat an opponent like the Patriots on the road. I'm just extremely proud of their effort today."

On winning a game vs. a winning team for first time...

We've hopefully learned from [the experiences of losing close games] and we've tried to fix the problems as we go and adjust our approach. I thought

we did a good job in terms of playing Indy, but we didn't finish it out. Here was another team with a fantastic quarterback. To do the things that we did offensively—to get the clock down—and finish the game defensively, as I said, it was a great team effort there at the end—the punt as well.

On defensive changes made...

Each week [the defense] is going to change. A lot of the things that you saw here today were elements we've had in place throughout the whole course of the season. I think we're getting better at running them, I think we're getting better at executing them; that was a point of emphasis over the bye week. As we get more and more successful at doing those things, we can add the multiples to the equation. I think that the defense did a nice job throughout the game disguising fronts, moving around, disguising

coverages, and that really helped us.

QB Chad Pennington

On preparation...

In our bye week we just concentrated on us. We looked at our first eight games and really dissected them and looked where we could get better as a team. We knew that we left some plays out there, some points out there, and some games out there. But that's the NFL. We wanted to look at the last half of the season and just take it one game at a time.

On lack of pressure...

Our offensive line did a great job. There was the one sack. Hats off to those guys. They've been getting better and better each week since the first week. It just seems like they're coming together, they're gelling. Our younger guys are not playing like younger guys and our veterans are setting the standard for them.

On punting...

Well we work on that believe it or not. Field position in a sloppy-weather game is so critical to a team's success and it was a great call by Coach [Eric] Mangini to try to get them pinned and luckily it got them pinned inside the 5 [yard line], which helps out a lot.

On Jerricho Cotchery's touchdown...

I thought they were playing our route and he was the one single guy. [Ellis] Hobbs had pretty good coverage. He was playing off-coverage, and I just felt like if I gave [Jerricho Cotchery] a chance he could make something happen for us and he did.

On practicing in the elements...

You could tell in the warm-ups. It seemed like it wasn't raining. Everyone was focused on catching the ball and it was just another warm-up for everyone else. We've been practicing on a similar field also, so all those situations that occurred today, I think we've been practicing with.

On playing well against the Patriots...
